TASKS TO BE ASSESSED	Y OR N	COMMENTS	
<ul> <li>HARNESSING UP AND DRIVING</li> <li>Assemble and discuss a Single Set of Harness</li> <li>Name parts of the harness and assemble</li> <li>Discuss care and cleaning of all types of harness</li> <li>Be aware of the importance of checking the stitching and condition</li> <li>Know the most vulnerable parts e.g. rein-billets, girth, neck straps</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>HARNESS THE EQUINE WHILE DIRECTING AN ASSISTANT TO HELP</li> <li>Leave a suitable head-collar on</li> <li>Put harness on, in correct order, and demonstrate adjustment to ensure a correct fit</li> <li>Discuss the suitability of the harness for RDA Carriage Driving, including safety features</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>DEMONSTRATE PUTTING TO AND DISCUSS BALANCE OF A 2 (IF THE GROUP USES ONE) OR 4-WHEELER</li> <li>Put to, in a safe flat place (this should ideally not in an open field, but may be necessary depending on where the group meets) in the correct manner</li> <li>Be able to instruct a helper on how to assist</li> <li>Understand the balance of 2-wheeled vehicles, and how to adjust for it (if the group has no 2-wheeled vehicles in their group then this is not applicable)</li> <li>Discuss balance of 4-wheeler – distribution of weight and position of wheelchair</li> <li>Understand the difference between fixed and independent shafts</li> <li>Discuss types of carriages built for RDA work, with reference to ramps, types and size and number of wheels, ease of entry</li> <li>Discuss vehicle care and storage</li> </ul>			
DEMONSTRATE MOUNTING AND DISMOUNTING THE VEHICLE FROM BOTH SIDES  • Demonstrate correct mounting procedure and taking up of both sets of reins			
<ul> <li>DISCUSS SAFETY AWARENESS OF PREPARING TO DRIVE</li> <li>Putting to and taking out require precise instructions from the CD Coach to the team helping them</li> <li>This is one of the most unsafe parts of carriage driving, where the pony is neither completely in nor completely out of the carriage.</li> </ul>

COMPLETE A SHORT DRIVE DEMONSTRATING REIN HANDLING, COACHMAN STYLE		
<ul> <li>Demonstrate good rein handling, e.g. lengthening reins, shortening reins, turns, emergency stops and hand-signals</li> <li>Demonstrate use of whip</li> <li>Show halt/walk/trot and rein-back transitions</li> <li>Use of aids identified</li> <li>Show an ability to drive two-handed when necessary</li> <li>Explain why coachman style rein handling must be used in RDA Carriage Driving sessions and why 2-handed driving may be preferable to coachman style in occasional situations, such as demonstrating to the disabled driver for cone-driving purposes</li> <li>Show an ability to drive circles and between cones</li> </ul>		
ASSISTING AN AMBULANT OR NON-AMBULANT DISABLED DRIVER INTO THE CARRIAGE, WITH COACH IN CARRIAGE, WITH HEAD-HOLDER IN PLACE WITH LEAD ROPE ATTACHED  • Demonstrate the attaching of dual reins and discuss their position on the bit, headcollar or terrets  • Instruct an adequate number of helpers to assist ambulant disabled driver into the carriage  • Instruct at least three helpers to assist a non-ambulant wheelchair user into the carriage  • Identify suitable areas for ambulant or non-ambulant drivers to get into and out of the carriage  • Discuss the importance of RDA Coach and helper competence when assisting non-ambulant wheelchair users into the carriage. Discuss security of wheelchairs, e.g. clamps/straps, use of lap-belts, footrests on wheelchair, or independent footrest on floor of carriage  • Discuss all aspects required for of assisting ambulant disabled drivers into the carriage including their security and comfort when seated; i.e, use of cushions or other supports to aid balance, and use of footrests		
<ul> <li>PREPARATION TO CARRIAGE DRIVE WITH DISABLED DRIVER</li> <li>Discuss rein adjustments and adaptations. Rein bars, looped reins, ladder reins, non-slip reins, or coloured tape on disabled driver's reins (red on right and white on left for identification when left/right is not known)</li> <li>Demonstrate Coaching of Disabled Drivers- holding the reins (may be different for drivers with varying abilities), and use of reins to steer or stop</li> <li>Use of voice commands to ask equine to move off, go up/down a pace or stand</li> <li>Positive and attentive manner and attitude towards disabled driver</li> </ul>		



#### **DEMONSTRATE TAKING OUT**

 At the end of the practical driving session, demonstrate taking the equine out of the carriage and unharnessing, using the reverse procedure for putting to.

### Role of the CD Coach

<ul> <li>DISCUSS THE USE OF HELPERS/ VOLUNTEERS AND THEIR ROLES</li> <li>Number of helpers required to assist the turnout</li> <li>Position and role of helpers when on a drive</li> <li>Use of helpers on bicycles</li> <li>Use of backstepper on a 4-wheeled carriage</li> <li>Position and role of helpers when turnout is in an indoor or outdoor arena when driving around the arena, doing dressage, or cones</li> </ul>		
<ul> <li>DISCUSS SAFE PLACES TO DRIVE</li> <li>Being mindful of the load the equine can pull on various surfaces –         (see weight chart guidelines).</li> <li>Flat or undulating ground, Indoor or Outdoor Arenas, Roads, Tracks or Fields</li> </ul>		
DISCUSS RELEVANCE TO PROGRESSION WITH DIFFERENT DRIVERS     Recognise how much/little to help the disabled driver, and understand it is essential to allow them to drive as much as possible themselves		
<ul> <li>SAFETY</li> <li>Use of hard hats and gloves</li> <li>Correct size of equine, coach, disabled driver</li> <li>Recognise concerns with equine, including body language</li> <li>Disabled driver: Signs of stress, discomfort, slipping, getting cold, etc</li> </ul>		
ACCIDENT PROCEDURE  MUST:  • Have the knowledge and experience to react correctly and efficiently  • Know how to restrain an equine as required  • Know how to release an equine quickly in an emergency situation  • Be able to take charge and instruct each helper confidently and concisely in such a situation  • Be aware of Group Policy on Safety		





# Equine Care and Knowledge

BASIC HANDLING		
<ul> <li>Put on a headcollar and lead in hand</li> <li>Tie up safely using a quick release knot</li> </ul>		
GROOMING AND FOOT CARE		
<ul> <li>Identify all items of a grooming kit</li> <li>Discuss and demonstrate their use</li> <li>Demonstrate foot care</li> <li>Discuss shoeing, and know when to call a farrier</li> </ul>		
GRASS KEPT EQUINE - CARE AND FEEDING		
<ul> <li>Discuss the requirements of a grass kept equine - water, fencing, area requirements, and poisonous plants</li> <li>Supplementary feeding requirements, e.g. use of hay, haylage, feed mixes, equine nuts, clean wheat straw and oats</li> <li>Know how to tie up a hay-net</li> </ul>		
TRAVELLING		
<ul> <li>Prepare equine for travelling</li> <li>Put on rugs and tail guard</li> <li>Load and unload from a trailer</li> </ul>		
MINOR ACCIDENTS AND INJURIES		
<ul> <li>Know when influenza and tetanus injections should be given</li> <li>Recognise the symptoms of when an equine is unwell e.g. coat, ears, runny eyes</li> <li>Know the normal temperature, and how to take it</li> <li>Recognise lameness</li> <li>Discuss possible injuries associated with a harness equine</li> <li>Discuss basic equine First Aid (e.g. bathing, bandaging, when to call a vet)</li> </ul>
